As a result, we were forced to cancel our retreat but as the year proceeded we were able to pivot to the online world.

The Zoom online platform became a necessary tool as some of our Centering Prayer groups moved to this format in an effort to gather, pray and support one another.

As we moved deeper into the pandemic experience of 2020, we held an online gathering in December with participants from across the SWOCCO region taking part. The SWOCCO 2021 May retreat took place online due to the continuing restrictions. It featured Hélène Goulet who returned to be our presenter after being well received at our May 2019 retreat.

Marlene Kelly-Kolotylo: An expression of thanks

I have the privileged task of offering a few words regarding a wonderful woman who has given much to the Centering Prayer movement in Southwestern Ontario and beyond, namely Marlene Kelly-Kolotylo. I had the pleasure of first meeting Marlene at an introductory workshop hosted by the church I was serving as a minister. Our relationship has deepened over the past 15 years and I am grateful to Marlene for her contemplative bearing, warmth and compassion that is so evident in her life.

Marlene was first introduced to Centering Prayer when she was living in Winnipeg, Manitoba. She found this style of prayer deeply attractive and that initial experience led her to explore more deeply in the 1980s and 90s as Contemplative Outreach was getting itself established. Marlene moved to Southwestern Ontario and it was there that she met Rose-Marie McIsaac. This introduction brought Marlene into Centering Prayer circles in Ontario and she made connections with others who shared her passion for the contemplative dimension of the Gospel.

In the early 2000s Marlene began to receive training in order to assume greater leadership and responsibility in the growing movement of Contemplative Outreach. This call to leadership brought her into contact with the late Carolyn Gratton, completion of facilitator training and service as part of the Canadian team of Contemplative Outreach. Marlene also served for a number of years as the first regional coordinator of SWOCCO and at the provincial level as well.

Marlene has given much to the establishment and flourishing of Centering Prayer in Canada because she sees Centering Prayer as a way of life, as a way of coordinating with the "Holy Present" in the ordinary moments of life. For her it is a vehicle for grace. Contemplative Outreach has given her a contemplative community, a vessel, to hold her contemplative practice and offer it to others. This support has taken on a deeper significance with the passing of her husband, David, in February of 2020.

On behalf of the SWOCCO service team and members I would like to express my deepest thanks to Marlene for her presence and the gifts that she has shared in her ministry over the years to promote Centering Prayer. We have been and continue to be touched deeply.

Thomas Keating On Pentecost

The Spirit is not given only once. He is an ongoing promise, an endless promise — a promise that is always fulfilled and always being fulfilled, because the Spirit is infinite and boundless and can never be fully plumbed. {...}

The Spirit is the ultimate promise of the Father. A promise is a free gift. No one is bound to make a promise. Once a promise is made, however, one is bound. When God binds himself, it is with absolute freedom, absolute fidelity. The Spirit, as promise, is a gift, not a possession. He is a promise that has been communicated; hence never to be taken back, since God is infinitely faithful to his promises. {...}

The divine Spirit is all gift but will not acquiesce to a possessive attitude. He is all ours as long as we give him away. {...}

The Spirit is the gift of God welling up in the Trinity from the common heart of the Father and the Son. He is the overflow of the divine life into the sacred humanity of Jesus, and then into the rest of us, his members.
